



Best Practice for EEO Hiring How to Translate Military Experience

Value: Each year about 200,000 service members transition to civilian life and, in most cases, are in search of a civilian career. Military experience translation is the process of decoding military skills and duties to uncover comparable positions in the civilian workforce. Knowing how to translate military experience increases our ability to identify qualified applicants and, in so doing, enhances the unit and university's outreach and recruitment efforts of protected veterans.

Before application material review:

- Carefully consider the requirements for the position you plan to fill.

During application material review:

- The first step in the application review process should be to gain an understanding of any military jargon used in the application materials to clearly match required qualifications for the position.

- Identify and highlight obtained degrees, comparable workshops, completed courses, as well as hands on experience that can serve as substitutes for desired experience and education.
- Match or make connections between skills acquired during service and desired skills for the position. (Keep in mind that the skills assessment does not supersede the requirement that the candidate meet the minimum requirements of the position.)

- **Examples of positions at ECU versus transferrable military experience:**

Military skills are transferable to a number of positions at ECU. To determine whether your candidate's military experience transfers to the position you are recruiting, the Veterans Job Matcher, found here:

- **Example #1:**

Military Position: Boiler Repair Technician

Duties: “Construct, assemble, maintain, and repair stationary steam boilers and boiler house auxiliaries.”

Acquired Skills: “Operation monitoring, operation and control, critical thinking, equipment maintenance, and quality control analysis.”

Comparable ECU Position: Utilities Plant Operator

Duties: Operate steam boilers; maintain proper air/fuel ration; perform testing of boiler feed water and condensate; maintain plant log by recording specified temperatures and pressures, fuel consumption, water flows, and other similar data.

- **Example #2:**

Military Position: Nodal Network Systems Operator-Maintainer

Duties: “Analyze, test, troubleshoot, and evaluate existing network systems, such as local area network (LAN), wide area network (WAN), and Internet systems or a segment of a network system. Perform network maintenance to ensure networks operate correctly with minimal interruption.”

Acquired skills: “Critical thinking, active listening, judgement and decision making, and reading comprehension.”

Comparable ECU Position: IT Network Professional

Duties: maintenance, disaster recovery, and troubleshooting of various enterprise-level network services; monitor and analyze the network system via various operating systems and monitoring tools.

- **Common transferable military skills:**

Leadership, self-sufficiency, effective communication, technology skills, problem-solving, and teamwork

- Take time to consider how military accomplishments translate to the candidate’s ability to complete position duties
